GABBY'S PARENTS KNEW THEIR GROWING FAMILY WOULD NEED SPECIAL SUPPORT.

Only three years old, Gabby has been through a lot, yet nothing seems to slow her down.

Gabby was born prematurely and spent three months in the neonatal intensive care unit. As an infant, Gabby underwent three heart surgeries, one of which led to complications requiring her foot to be partially amputated.

Gabby started physical therapy with the United Way-funded Birth-to-Three program at Curative Care Network when she was just five months old. Her physical therapist helped Gabby adjust to tummy time and worked to strengthen her muscles so she could sit up and crawl.
