## Milwaukee **One Key Question**

**Pilot Results** September 2016 - August 2017 One Key Question® (OKQ), a strategy developed by the Oregon Foundation for Reproductive Health, asks women, "Would you like to become pregnant in the next year?" and provides them appropriate follow-up care and counseling.

The pilot was spearheaded by the Milwaukee Lifecourse Initiative for Health Families (LIHF), convened by United Way of Greater Milwaukee & Waukesha County with funding from the UW School of Medicine and Public Health from the Wisconsin Partnership Program.


