yes 13% **no 83%**

action taken based on response

- 368** women received preconception care
- 6,110** women received a prescription for birth control
- 519** women initiated a Long Acting Reversible Contraception (LARC)



Why ask?

- To offer patient-centered care
- To start and normalize conversations on reproductive health
- To direct women to existing, effective services for preconception and contraceptive care

Next Steps

- Expand One Key Question to more and varied Milwaukee providers
- Make it easy for providers to implement
- Collect more data, especially on patient outcomes
- Increase public awareness of One Key Question
- Ask One Key Question of men
